

# Welcome to Shadyside Presbyterian Church

*We are grateful for your presence and invite you to participate in the worship, study, fellowship, and service of this congregation.*

**If you are a guest with us this morning**, our ushers are available to assist you.

**Nursery care** is available for infants through three-year-olds during worship. Pagers are available. A cry room with a video broadcast of worship is available in the Craig Room, accessible through the Narthex.

**Children in Worship** - At 11:00 a.m., families with two- and three-year-olds are welcome to report directly to the Nursery. Four-year-olds through second-graders attend worship and may exit with their teachers before the sermon to participate in chapel worship and children's activities. (If you are a first-time guest, please accompany your child to the Chapel, and then you may return to the Sanctuary.) Parents should meet their children in the Christian education classrooms after worship. On the first Sunday of the month, first- and second-graders stay in worship through the entire service for Communion. A bulletin insert designed for children is available in the Narthex.

**Flower Ministry** - After worship, members of the Board of Deacons' Flower Ministry divide the chancel flowers into bouquets to be distributed to individuals who are celebrating joyous occasions and to those who could use some cheer. If you would like to deliver a bouquet to someone you know, please stop by the front of the Sanctuary after worship to receive one. Help us to share God's love through flowers.

**Individual listening devices** for improved sound are available for those with hearing needs. Please see an usher in the Narthex.

**Fifth Avenue Parking** - Parking on the inbound side of the block from Wilkins Avenue to Amberson Avenue is not available for parking on Sunday mornings. Parking is available on the outbound side as well as both sides of Fifth Avenue from Amberson Avenue into Oakland. We appreciate your helpfulness utilizing these available parking areas on Sunday mornings.



## About This Morning’s Music

Lee Hoiby (1926–2011) was an American composer and pianist. Best known as a composer of operas and songs, he was a disciple of composer Gian Carlo Menotti. Like Menotti, Hoiby composed works that are marked by lyricism during a time when this style was deemed old-fashioned and irrelevant. His most well-known works are his setting of Tennessee Williams’ *Summer and Smoke*, and his many songs and arias championed by Leontyne Price. Though most of his works involve vocalists, he also wrote some instrumental works, particularly chamber music. His choral music is widely performed throughout the United States and in Great Britain. Some of his most important works are in that form, including the Christmas cantata *A Hymn of the Nativity* (text by Richard Crashaw), the oratorio *Galileo Galilei* (libretto by Barrie Stavis), and a substantial group of works for chorus and orchestra on texts of Walt Whitman and John Donne.

## Mission Partner Spotlight

In 1924, Shadyside Presbyterian Church built a hospital in the Shantung Province of China. The hospital was part of a larger mission compound that was used as an internment camp during World War II. (Langdon Gilkey's book, *Shantung Compound*, relates his experience in this internment camp.) This hospital is now a historical site, surrounded by Shadyside Park. In an attempt to renew and restore our relationships in this region, various teams from Shadyside have traveled to China, most recently in October 2015 for our fifth visit. Highlights of this relationship include exploring a historic culture, reliving our own history, and continuing discussions with a church in Wei Hei to enable us to walk alongside the growing Christianity of China.

## Sesquicentennial Celebration

In 2016, Shadyside Presbyterian Church celebrates 150 years of ministry in Pittsburgh and around the world. On Sunday, October 2, the church commemorates its sesquicentennial anniversary with an extended service of worship beginning at 10:45 a.m. with a prelude for brass, timpani, and organ. The service also will include a homily of celebration preached by the Reverend Dr. Conrad C. Sharps; the participation of past ministers in observance of World Communion Sunday, first celebrated at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in 1933; and music commissioned by the church and composed by Mark A. Anderson. An elegant reception in the Parish Hall follows worship. In addition to the opportunity for guests to enjoy fellowship and refreshments, author Tim Engleman will present a newly published volume of church history, the Chancel Choir will release a new CD with music celebrating the history of Shadyside, and special guests will share brief remarks.
